## Disc 3 ~ Fool's Gold Gold Rush



### Video Summary

This episode tells the story of Jedediah Daniel who, in the 1800s, set his sights toward the Wild West to strike it rich in the California Gold Rush. ## Primary Lesson ~ Faith More Precious than Gold

All humans have a desire to be rich, to make a name for themselves. This has been true since the beginning of time, but there have been a very precious few who have understood the mystery of true wealth. The Bible states in 1 Peter that our faith, faith in Christ, is more precious than gold, yet we seldom focus on this fact. And when we do set our sights on a deeper faith-walk with God, we find ourselves giving up after a few short years. God has prepared for each of us a future and a life that can not only be rewarding and adventurous for us, but can also bring glory and honor to Him.

The secret to this success with God is not found in our efforts to impress Him but our efforts to please Him, and this can only be done through a life committed to faith in Christ. There are many who have had an encounter with God and it has revolutionized everything about them, they in a sense “found gold” but because the going got tough, they decided that it was somehow not worth it and their continued efforts would be in vain. Jesus promises us that our life of faith and commitment to Him will be rewarded in this life and the life to come, but there will be tests and obstacles along the way. If we will remain faithful and keep our eyes fixed on Him, we are promised a crown of life at the end of our lives.



## Facts, Figures & Illustrations ~ The California Gold Rush

The major California Gold Rush lasted from 1849 to approximately 1869. The Mother Lode (a name for the California gold fields) produced approximately \$250,000,000 worth of gold. The Gold Rush changed California forever. However, most miners went home broke. The real money was made by freighters and merchants who brought and marketed supplies. Levi Strauss ‘struck it rich’ by making and selling dry goods and durable pants.

Although there have been many gold rushes, the California Gold Rush brought over 200,000 new people to California in just a few years. Many novice prospectors mistook pyrite for real gold. Pyrite is often called ‘fool’s gold.’ It can be identified in the field by the sulfur smell of the powdered mineral. Its metallic luster and pale-to-normal, brass-yellow hue have earned it the nickname fool’s gold due to many miners mistaking it for the real thing, though small quantities of actual gold are sometimes found in pyrite. In fact, such auriferous pyrite is a valuable ore of gold.

There were two main ways of mining gold. Digging shafts into the side of a hill or down into the ground was called *lode mining*. *Placer mining* involved using water with tools (pans, long toms, hydraulic monitors, or others) to sift through the dirt.

A California-bound airline in 1849!?! Don’t laugh; it almost happened. Rufus Porter, founder of Scientific American, planned to fly 49ers west on propeller-driven balloons powered by steam engines. He went as far as to advertise the expedition, and 200 brave souls signed up for the trip. But the “airline” never got off the ground.

Because of poor planning, many western-bound 49ers were unprepared for the hot, dry deserts of Nevada. A few sharp businessmen in California knew this and took advantage of the situation. They traveled eastward with barrels of water. Extremely thirsty, many 49ers paid \$1, \$5, even \$100 for a glass of precious water.

## Discussion Questions

1. Why is faith so important? Why does the Bible say it is more precious than gold? Discuss Hebrews 11:6 and how it relates to your life.
2. What are the areas in your life where you have given up and stopped looking for gold? Maybe it is in the form of relationships with friends, families, or even with God? What are some practical steps you can take to begin to reopen those closed mines in your life and begin to work in faith again?
3. Why is the promise of a gold rush so enticing? What part of our nature is drawn into this lust for natural, instant wealth? Conversely, spiritual gold isn't discovered overnight, but through many labors and trials. Discuss the difference between the natural desire for quick wealth, and the true Biblical definition of spiritual riches, and what it takes to obtain it.
4. What would you do, and how far would you go to obtain gold that was ready for mining? Using this same ravenous desire as a model, to what extent would you pursue the riches of God's Kingdom? Do you remember a time when you were that passionate for intimacy with God, that everything else was worthless? How can you stir each other up to this same passion again?



## Complimentary Story ~ The True Value of a Life Saved

Many years ago a prospector was returning from Australia where he had made a fortune in gold mining. Being a simple and shrewd fellow, he never sold his gold for cash; he chose to carry his riches on his person.
